THE NEIGHBORHOOD

THE HOME

Is there a garage?

Will the dog have access to the garage?

Is the garage climate-controlled?

Will the dog have access to the basement?

Would you have concerns about the dog having access to either of the above locations? If yes, explain:

Is there a **deck**? Is it safe for the dog to be out there?

How easy would it be for the dog to **escape** from the house, e.g. kitchen door opens into garage where garage door is always left open; doors don't close securely.

Any other dangers: e.g. poisonous plants, chemicals within reach; garbage; rodent poison; power tools, etc.

THE YARD

Is the yard completely and adequately fenced?

Is there direct access from the house to the yard?

Describe fence:

Does the yard appear to be "dog-safe?" Look for hazards such as obviously poisonous plants, sharp lawn equipment, or an unfenced swimming pool (or pool w/o easy way to climb out, hard cover or safety alarm)

If there is another pet in residence, is the yard cleaned of feces regularly?

Is there adequate shade?

Are there many critters in the area that might make a dog bolt through an electric fence (if present)

Is there a gate that is always kept locked (esp. important with children and workers who may leave the gate open)?

Are there any dogs or other animals that live adjacent to this property? If yes, do they appear hostile?

Is there a lot of foot traffic near the yard where people have easy access to the dog?

THE FAMILY

Did you meet the entire family? (Including roommates and nannies, etc)

Did any family member appear opposed to the adoption?

Is the family open and friendly, and willing to talk to you?

Do they have unrealistic expectations from a rescue dog? (For example, do they expect the dog to be perfectly housetrained, not to chew, not to dig, to get along immediately with other pets.)?

Are there children living in the home?

Are they well behaved and polite toward adults?

Do they act appropriately around dogs?

Have they been taught not to poke, pull, and otherwise torment family pets?

THE CURRENT PETS

Are there other pets currently in residence?

Please list all pets you met:

Are they clean and well fed? (Not obese, etc.)

Are they friendly?

Do they appear non-aggressive toward other dogs?

If there are any outdoor pets, do they have proper shelter? (Ask to see the doghouse, etc.) (Frankly, I would not want to see any outdoor dogs)

Are outdoor pets properly confined? (Chaining is not proper confinement.)

Are there dog toys in evidence?

IF yes, type of toys:

Is there fresh water out? Is food left out all day? (bad)

If you see other neighbors, don't hesitate to introduce yourself and explain that the applicants are applying for a dog to adopt, See if they will comment on how the other dog or past dogs/animals have been treated (or perhaps they had animals for short times that they did not tell us about)
